FINANCIAL REPORT

FOR THE AGM

OF

JUNE 13, 2015

Forward:

- The attached financial statements have been audited by our external auditor, who has issued an opinion that is considered "standard" for an organization like Judo BC.
- An increase in Judo Canada fees has necessitated an increase in Judo BC fees, by \$5 per year for all membership types.
- We are in sound financial condition, and are well-positioned to continue our activities into the future.

2014-15 fiscal year highlights:

- The current year was more of a "normal" year compared to the results of hosting Nationals in the 2013-14 fiscal year, although there are several new revenue and expense categories arising from the Canada Winter Games and the Western Canada Games.
- Our single largest revenue/expense category, "Athlete development" has been presented differently this year. Instead of showing amounts collected from athletes as revenue, the net expense to Judo BC is shown in the expenditures section. The reason for this is that the amounts paid by the athletes do not represent an increase of resources to Judo BC, but merely a reduction of costs borne by Judo BC. The 2013/14 comparative amount has been shown the same way, and a disclosure of the gross amounts is shown in Note 5.
- On the expense side was an increase in contract labour due to the having a full year of 1.4 "full time equivalent" staff (only for part of the year last year).
- The 50th Anniversary event held last summer was intended to be a break-even event, and showed a small amount of profit related to the dinner, less the net expense of printing the 50th Anniversary books (\$7,166 in "publications").
- Capital assets increased by approximately \$5,000 due to the purchase of CARE systems for refereeing.
- Our financial position remains very similar to last year, with approximately \$223,000 in net assets (\$214,000 last year). We have normal receivables and payables from our day-to-day activities. The largest change from last year is the decrease in deferred revenue (\$0 this year, \$32,980 last year) which was funding that we have received for specific programs in prior years and recognized as income this year as it related to 2015 activities.

Budget highlights for 2015/16 fiscal year:

Looking forward to the proposed budget for the 2015/16 fiscal year, there is much in common with the last two years, with the more significant differences being:

- Increase in Grants and membership committee expenditures due to an application for "Sports on Mats" funding
- Revenue and expense for BC Winter Games
- Staff and contract labour increased based on hiring a Sport Development Director in September, and;
- Budgets for active committees are based on the Committees' proposed budgets, adjusted for actual 2014/15 expenses and availability of funds.





President's & Judo Canada report

As always I need to start my report by thanking all the staff, committee members, board and other members for making so much happen at Judo BC. The success of our organization depends on everyone and I am happy that we have such dedicated people working on our behalf. Below is a brief summary of some of the things I have been working on for Judo BC and as part of Judo Canada.

- Our search for a Sport Development Director continues. We reviewed some candidates and decided in the fall to re-post our ad. The posting was set to close April 30th and I spent some time with the Judo Canada High Performance director reviewing resumes and coming up with a short list. We have a front runner at the moment with an offer out to him. We have agreed to have a decision with him in June and are in the process of working with other candidates if that one does not work out.
- The wonderful work everyone did a few years ago at the Nationals has not gone unnoticed and Judo Canada has approached us to potentially host the Kata and Veteran's World Championships for the IJF. This is a huge event and would be the first time it will be held in Canada. It is a true honor for Judo BC to be involved in it. Coincidentally we were also contacted by the World Master's Games about participating in the Judo tournament for that event as well. This is scheduled for the summer of 2016 and we should know if Judo is a confirmed sport soon. Both events will require a lot of work but will be very rewarding for the participants, volunteers and spectators. Hosting more international events is part of Judo Canada plans going forward and I am sure Judo BC will be involved going forward.
- Judo Canada is in the process of moving the office to Montreal. With the new National Training Center in Montreal and the concentration of staff in Montreal it made sense to move the physical office there as well. Staff who live in Ottawa will be able to work remotely part time and make the commute to Montreal occasionally as well.
- As many of you know the Nationals are slated to be in a single location for the next three years. Judo BC bid on having them in Richmond at the oval but in the end Calgary was successful. Despite our disappointment at not being able to be the home team Calgary is still a great location for us in BC. The travel costs will be much lower than going back East and the time change better as well. It is my hope that we can field a large team in the next three years and increase our medal count as well.
- In international events the Pan Am Confederation has had its share of controversy. The congress
 in Edmonton (during the Pan Am Championships) took over 6 hours and every item presented
 was voted down. At the end of the congress the President of the PJC was presented with a letter
 signed by 19 countries (including Canada) requesting 4 things:
 - To call an extraordinary Congress on June 6th 2015 in Mexico city
 - The removal of the President, the General secretary and the General treasurer
 - The elections of new President, General Secretary and General treasurer
 - To comply with all the request according to the bylaws



Judo Canada will be present at the extra ordinary congress and we will report back as to the results.

- As noted above the Pan am championships were held in Edmonton, AB this past April and they were very successful both a competitive and hosting point of view. The facility at the University of Alberta was well suited to the tournament and the large replay screen added to the excitement. Canada scored very will with 7 individual medals as well as a bronze for the men's team and GOLD for the women's team. It was a great weekend and Canada can be proud of our athletes and again our volunteers.
- I also had the pleasure of attending the Canada Winter Games in Prince George in February as the Sport Information Officer. There was great sprit in the athlete's village and the Judo venue for the week of competition. It was a busy time, coordinating media requests and updating the Judo Canada Twitter feed but there was great Judo on the mats and BC performed very well.
- Judo Canada was approached about taking Jujitsu under its mandate and is looking into the ramifications of such a move. Not a lot of detail on this is available but I will continue to update our membership going forward.

This concludes my report for the President and Judo Canada for the past year. I look forward to continuing in my duties next year should the membership decide to re-elect me.

Executive Director Report 2014-15

It has been another busy year at Judo BC. Below are some of the highlights of some of the activities, beyond the general duties, that have keep the Judo BC office staff busy since the 2014 Annual General Meeting.

Sports on Mats Pilot

The Sports on Mats pilot was rolled out successfully in 4 regions in BC, mostly in schools, with one recreation department participating as well. 14 schools participated allowing 97 teachers to participate in a co-teaching environment with a Sports on Mats Instructor. We also delivered the program into the StrongStart program (kids ages 0 - 5) in two schools, which is new territory for sport based programming. The program is a collaborative approach to delivering fundamental movement & sport skills to kids ages 4 - 7, with a focus on combative sports. With the support of the BC Government & ViaSport BC through a BC Sport Participant Grant, as well as the guidance of sports consultant Drew Mitchell, we were able to have 1950 kids go through the program! This is an amazing number consider the overall membership for Judo BC as of May 1, 2015 is 2490.

We have requested another grant for 2015-16 and hope to have even more kids exposed to the program with the ultimate goal of getting more kids interested in doing judo. More information about the pilot, plus plans for 2015-16, will be presented at the 2015 AGM.

Girls Only Summer Camp

The first Girls Only Summer Camp was held August 26 - 28, 2014. The camp was a huge success thanks to a great venue and wonderful food provided by Camp Hatikvah, fabulous instructors – Aline Strasdin, Donna Hanson, Renee Hock, Karen Sharp, Lisa Nakajima & Kathy Hubble and support from the Lake Country Judo Club, who not only lent us their mats but, also delivered and set up them up. But the most important reason the camp was a success is due to an amazing group of campers! We had so much fun that we've added an additional day to the 2nd annual cam, which is set for August 24 - 27, 2015 at the same venue.

JudoBC Kids

The JudoBC Kids website is set to launch at the 2015 AGM. Jack Mah of Kota Media, along with the input of Lynn Fingarson the graphic designer that developed the concept for JudoBC kids, has put together an amazing site that is mobile friendly, includes an easy to use club finder app and has lots of fun and educational information for parents and children. This site, along with JudoBC Kids posters and print materials (available August 2015), will be a great promotional resource for all of our clubs that offer programs to kids 12 and under.

Shiai and CARE System

Judo Canada offered training to Provinces that host A level Nationals Tournaments for the new draw/results program, Shiai system, and CARE (Computer Aided Replay) referee system now being used in Canada. We selected 2 members from Steveston Judo Club, Lorna Nakakjima and Lynn Fellowes, along with IT guru and referee Soheil Gorgi, to attend the training in Montreal in November. Lorna and Lynn, with help from the Judo Canada rep, Christan Royer, seamlessly used the program to run the Pacific International in March. Soheil organized the purchase of the CARE

system and the successful use of this equipment for Pacific International. We plan to offer training in these new systems in the fall of 2015 with the aid of our newly trained experts. We hope that all clubs will use this software for running tournaments so that we can create consistency across the province in how our tournaments are run. The CARE system equipment will be available for use at Provincial level tournaments upon request.

Strategic Planning

Strategic planning for the 2015 – 2019 period started in the Fall of 2013 with a review of the 2009 – 2014 plan, followed up by the Board agreeing to adopt the Judo Canada strategic plan in February of 2014. The next steps in the process included: selecting the appropriate sections of the Judo Canada plan to integrate into the Judo BC plan, reviewing the strategic goals set by our funding partners, compiling feedback from the membership, including the information gathered at the round table discussions at the 2014 AGM and ensuring sport sector best practices were being followed in the development of the plan. Once this phase was complete the Board worked with a sports sector strategic planning expert, Marilyn Payne, to finalize the framework and set the areas of emphasis and determine the key strategic objects for each area. The plan will be presented at the 2015 AGM and the AGM attendees will be given an opportunity to provide input into the operational plan which is the "how to" of the strategic plan.

I would like to extend a special thank you to Aline Strasdin, the Sport Chair of the 2015 Canada Winter Games and to acknowledge the hard work, dedication and enthusiasm displayed by an amazing group of volunteers that helped to make the Games a great experience for all involved.

I would also like to thank all the clubs that hosted regional training, provincial training camps, coaching courses, tournaments and other events throughout the year.

The commitment and dedication shown by the membership, committees and the Board of Directors to the philosophy of Judo is both inspirational and motivational to the office staff, and makes us enjoy working for Judo BC every day.

TEAM BC REPORT May 2015

It has been a very busy season this year for the BC Team. In addition to our regularly busy schedule, we had the Elite 8 Nationals, Canada Winter Games, and the upcoming Western Canada Summer Games.

In order for our athletes to be more successful and to transfer from the Provincial Team to the National Team, they need to get more exposure to competitions and camps. We sent a team to the Quebec Open, National Training Camp, and Ontario Open. This is a reality for many of our national team members who compete abroad and do this type of training/competing.

We also sent a team to the Elite 8 closed nationals. The purpose of this competition is to get Canada's best athletes fighting and training together more often. The timing of the tournament means that many of our athletes need to manage their training over the Christmas holidays and ease up on the food and other festivities that this time brings. This is a reality of high performance athletes.

After the Elite 8 nationals, we spent a week at the new National Training Center. This is a beautiful dojo in the Olympic Stadium with four fighting areas and four national coaches. This was supported by Judo Canada as an Introduction to the National Training Center. We did morning training with the national team and coaches Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday. Randori training with the National Team Monday to Thursday and went on tours of Concordia University and McGill University. This was very successful and it is one way that Judo Canada wants to make a bridge for our provincial level athletes to the National Training Center. Once again, we supported the Sask Open. This is a great competition for U16 and U18 athletes. Our athletes tend to be fairly successful at this competition and it features athletes from the four Western Provinces.

The Steveston Judo Club hosted the Pacific International again this year, but also provided a great training camp afterwards. We were very fortunate to have 1981 World Champion, Kashiwazaki, do a technical session with the athletes and tell everyone about how he wasn't very good at judo, but it didn't matter because he was still World Champion. National Coach, Janusz Pawlowski, also lead technical and randori sessions for everyone. Coach Pawlowski is a two time Olympic Medalist and three time World Medalist. Thank you to the Steveston Judo Club for hosting a great training camp!

Team BC just came back from the Canadian Championships in Saint Jean sur Richelieu. We won 20 medals including 4 Gold, 5 Silver, and 11 Bronze.

As an organization, we need to get our athletes to as many events as possible. Currently, to make the provincial team our athletes need to attend two camps and two competitions. Realistically, they should attend 10 or more events a year. Judo BC and all of our clubs need to support our regional, provincial, and western Canadian events. Judo BC has 1000 more members than Alberta, but our provincial team is the same size. We need more kids participating in our competitions and camps. Ultimately, we need our clubs to encourage as many of their students as possible to participate in the Youth Provincials, Pacific International, Edmonton International, Fall Camp, Winter Camp, and Spring Camp.

Judo BC Technical Committee Report May 2015

COACH DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE REPORT FOR THE AGM OF 13 June, 2015

Professional Development Points Update:

- PD points accumulation and recording was kicked off in January 2014, however, Judo has just recently been officially launched. Effective 20 May, 2015 all coach records have been converted to the new regime with level I certified being equivalent to Dojo Assistant (DA) certified, level II certified being equivalent to Dojo Instructor (DI) certified and level III certified being equivalent to Competition Development (Comp-Dev) certified. All transfers to the new paradigm have the word (transferred) after the certification in the Locker (Coaches Association of Canada online database). Please check your Locker records (https://thelocker.coach.ca/account/login?mode=login) to ensure the equivalency has occurred correctly. If you are not able to access your records in the Locker please contact the Judo BC office for assistance. This also means that effective 20 May, 2015 each coach will have 5 years to acquire the appropriate amount of professional development points (10 points for DA, 20 points for DI and 30 points for Comp-Dev) in order to maintain their current level of certification. It is yet to be determined the final process for what constitutes acceptable PD activities and what we can enter. I understand meetings with the CAC are occurring next week around this topic.
- PD points will not be pro-rated. The Locker will automatically reduce the required points for each coaching level to zero as activities are recorded. This would make it possible for a coach to acquire all the necessary points in year one and then not do any further upgrading for the rest of the period. Current period for Professional Development is 5 years.

Shodan Grading and the NCCP update reminder:

- The Coaches Association of Canada agreed that Shodan evaluation in judo meets the criteria for the NCCP module "Teaching and Learning Judo Skills" (credited with "In Training" status).
- In order for this to happen, all Shodan recipients must be credited in the Locker with this module, which can be done only by NCCP facilitators. If the successful Shodan candidate does not have a Locker profile, they must go to the Locker and create one. Once this is done, please submit the following to nccp@judobc.ca:
 - Name, first and last
 - CC #
 - Full address, with postal code
 - Date of Birth
 - Phone number
 - Active and unique email address
 - Date of grading

DA and DI course and certification reminders:

Prior to requesting an evaluation, it is very important that the coach (to be evaluated) has reviewed the evaluation template and has been evaluated by the club Sensei prior to the request. The committee is noting coach evaluation requests that are being submitted without a full understanding of this process.

- DA normal process:
 - o Take a course with Make Ethical Decision (MED) & Teaching and Learning modules
 - Coach for a minimum of 60 hours
 - Certification granted only after the practical examination (evaluation) complete, passing the on-line MED exam and the coach must be a minimum of 16 years old and sankyu (green). Certification practical exams must be a minimum of 45 minutes and must include a properly developed Lesson Plan (LP) and a functional Emergency Action Plan (EAP)
- DI normal process:
 - Take a DI course with Lesson and Season Planning, Basic Nutrition, U7/U9 Active Start and U11/U13, Learn to Train modules
 - Coach a minimum of 120 hours
 - Certification granted only after the practical examinations which must be a minimum of 60 minutes and must include a properly developed LP and a functional EAP. The coach must have passed the on-line MED, be 19 years old, Ikkyu (brown) and be a trained DA.

This gives us a total of 289 coaches through courses since June of 2010 with 23 percent female and 77 percent males. Coach certification has been lagging a bit but seems to be picking up recently.

A total of 6 courses were held in the last fiscal year, three DA course and three DI course. The CAC committee plans to hold two DI course and two DA courses in the next fiscal year (unless otherwise requested). Course schedule to be posted on the Judo BC website as they are determined. The Locker will start to be used for listing the course events, with coach registration being in the Locker. Payment for the courses will still be as is currently practiced.

Additionally, we are bringing into the committee Donna Hanson for support of all our female coaches. We are very excited about this as Donna is a fantastic role model and brings with her a wealth of knowledge and expertise.

In closing I would like to thank all those clubs and Senseis who have supported the coaching program over the last year. Without your interest and willingness to participate we could not have run as many courses or certified as many coaches. Thank you so much!

We give additional acknowledgments to Les who also became a member of the Judo Canada Referee Committee this year. This will help us be informed of the current IJF rule changes. The JBC Referee Committee (RC) wishes to thank Seiko for his dedicated commitment to develop referees in our province. The RC welcomes Graham Magnusson to the fold who will not only bring us his current International experiences, but also his rejuvenated input. The RC is also grateful to have Mr. Jim Kojima, Mr.Yeiji Inouye and now Mr. Seiko Ouchi as advisors to assist the committee.

The RC will continue to develop our referees at all levels and to increase the number of referees participating throughout the province.
